Believing, Belonging, Becoming and Branching Out

Grace and peace in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ! As the month of April has lavished us with the bright fluorescence of dogwood and a kaleidoscope of flowering blossoms, it only seems appropriate to turn our hearts and minds to Earth Day and Care of Creation Sunday.

It seems inappropriate that we only take one Sunday out of the whole liturgical year to contemplate the interconnectedness of life and reflect on God, the giver of every good gift, who created and sustains the universe and the complex web of life that beautifies the earth, magnifies God's grandeur, and displays the sacramental dimension of God's care for humans. Yet, even as I contemplate these things, I realize the web of creation is tenuous. Those species that reflect God's grandeur and magnificence are vulnerable- subject to pollution, abuse, and decay.

I don't have to tell you that climate change is altering the earth: accelerating the warming of our planet, the melting of polar ice caps, and spurring more traumatic weather patterns. Sadly, humankind is spurring this process along because of its dependence on fossil fuels, its resistance to changing existing technology, and its inability to garner and elicit international collaboration and cooperation among world powers with respect to emission standards and coordinating mitigating efforts.

What is humankind to do other than throw up their hands and plead for God's mercy? Not all is lost, luckily, people of faith can make a tremendous difference through utilizing their (and their community's) agency and affecting their sphere of influence. We can recycle, plant native species and blossoms that attract pollinators. We can reuse grocery bags, carpool with friends, and reduce our consumption of single-use plastics. There is a lot we can do individually and as a community to honor God's creation, to tune our hearts and minds to the God who has endowed creation with an abundance in earth, wind, sky, sea, plant and animals.

And, last but not least, we can take time for an environmental sabbath, "to notice the lilies of the field" (Matthew 6: 28). We can take time to attune our minds and hearts from the means of production that we are invested in and focused on six days out of the week, to contemplate the God who in Genesis gave us the production of the world, and on the seventh day rested.

We rest in this God who cares and upholds all living things in a complex web of destiny we are all attached to and cannot separate ourselves from. In recognition of our small place within the wide expanse of God's cosmos, we realize we are blessed to be in communion with a love that transposes our finiteness and opts for God's grandeur in the planetary exercise of God's grace. Or, in the words of Walt Whitman:

"We are Nature—long have we been absent, but now we return;

We become plants, leaves, foliage, roots, bark;

We are bedded in the ground—we are rocks; 5

We are oaks—we grow in the openings side by side;

We browse—we are two among the wild herds, spontaneous as any;

We are two fishes swimming in the sea together;

We are what the locust blossoms are—we drop scent around the lanes, mornings and evenings;

We are also the coarse smut of beasts, vegetables, minerals;

We are two predatory hawks—we soar above, and look down;

We are two resplendent suns—we it is who balance ourselves, orbic and stellar—we are as two comets;

We prowl fang'd and four-footed in the woods—we spring on prey;

We are two clouds, forenoons and afternoons, driving overhead;

We are seas mingling—we are two of those cheerful waves, rolling over each other, and interwetting each other;

We are what the atmosphere is, transparent, receptive, pervious, impervious:

We are snow, rain, cold, darkness—we are each product and influence of the globe;

We have circled and circled till we have arrived home again—we two have;

We have voided all but freedom, and all but our own joy."






